

When, why & how?

It's AD60; the British rebellion against the Romans has been crushed after a terrible battle in the Midlands between the Legions and the British tribes led by the legendary Boudica...

In the 1930s fragments of pottery and military artefacts were found on the site, but the full story wasn't uncovered until thirty years later when a team of archaeologists excavated the remains of a fort which had lain hidden for 2000 years.

The archaeology revealed that the Lunt dates from the same period as the Boudican rebellion. The presence of military structures and three grain storehouses indicate that the Lunt was built as a campaign headquarters and supply base for the region following the British rebellion.

What can you see & do this summer?

Open to the public during the summer and half term holidays, come down between Tuesday and Friday from 11am - 4pm and get involved in a packed daily programme of family crafts, activities and creative make and take sessions.

You could also take the time to climb the wooden ramparts and see the Fort spread out before you. The site boasts a reconstructed gyrus, a circular enclosure used to train cavalry horses, the only example found in the whole Roman Empire!

During your visit you can also discover a display of some of the fascinating finds from the site, including brooches, beads, rare coins, pottery and bronze horse decorations on display in the reconstructed granary.
